A 4th generation hop farmer, Austin was a respected, beloved pillar of the tight-knit community of St. Paul. He was also a multi-generational volunteer for the St. Paul Rodeo. In honor of his memory, the Marion County Farm Bureau Board of Directors donated \$2,500 to his GoFundMe campaign to help with family expenses.

"Austin was a prime example of the spirit of giving back that's so evident in Oregon's small agricultural towns, and he is deeply missed," said OFB President Angi Bailey.

Farm Bureau Members Testify Against Ag Overtime

Dozens of farm owners testified against the bill, warning that passage of the bill without amendments would bring ruin to Oregon's agricultural industry.

"This is not a threat, this is a reality. A cap will be placed so that farmers can continue to farm and operate," said an emotional Tiffany Monroe, a fifth-generation farmer who started her own farm in Junction City in 2020.

Passing a bill of this magnitude would devastate smaller farms, many said. Several referred to themselves as "price takers" not "price makers," unable to set their own prices for their crops. Even if market prices are down for their harvest, their workers and other costs remain the same.

"I will not be able to afford the time and a half for my pickers," Anne Krahmer-Steinkamp, a sixth-generation farmer in Oregon, said. The added costs would force her farm to switch to more mechanical harvesting rather than handpicking, she warned.

The agricultural business is unique, farmers said. The amendment proposed by Rep. Shelly Boshart Davis acknowledges that, they said.

"Agriculture is seasonal, and our work schedules are dictated by weather conditions and the tight time frames we work in. As a result, farmworkers rely on working extra

hours during these peak seasons to offset when there is not as much work or when the weather makes it impossible to work," Lesley Tamura, a fourth-generation pear grower from Hood River County, said. "Allowing a permanent peak season accommodation gives workers a chance to get the extra wages they need during busy times and gives family farms a chance at survival."

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A Message from the President

I am a 1st generation farmer and have been involved in Farm Bureau since I graduated from college. We farm wine grapes southeast of Salem as well as in Yamhill County in the Newberg/Yamhill area.

It's been a busy winter so far. In our vineyards the vines are getting pruned, tied, and set up for the coming year and it seems like everyone else is just as busy. We typically finish pruning around mid-March and will be ready for bud break around mid-April. We are hoping for more rain and snow - we need about 15" to 20" of precipitation to reach our "normal" average for the rainfall year. Let's hope that happens!

Ag overtime is the biggest issue in the 2022 Oregon short session. Thank you to all our members who wrote letters to their legislators, submitted written testimony and did an excellent job testifying in person. MCFB and OFB had a great turn out. It is so important that legislators hear from those of us involved in Agriculture. The short session will be completed by the time this Farm Gram is published so as I write this, we don't know the results of our efforts. We appreciate you, our members, and OFB staff working so diligently to achieve the best possible outcome. OFB staff is amazing.

Our newest directors (Casey Stadeli, Claire Zielinski, and Richard Hostetter) recently participated in a new directors' training presented by Dave Dillon, OFB Executive VP. He provided background material on Farm Bureau, there was good discussion and questions. We all left with a better understanding of the purpose and mission of Farm Bureau. The county Farm Bureaus are the foundation for the state and national levels. We are a "Grass Roots "organization that is driven by you, our members. We take a proactive approach to help farmers and ranchers and don't complain that "we don't like it", we figure out how to fix it.

Some good news, we can finally have our First Aid/CPR trainings this year. Unfortunately, we aren't having our Farm Tour in 2022, but we are hopeful we can get it back on track in 2023. Please let us know if there are farms, ranches or ag related businesses that you would like to visit; or if you'd like to help organize, that would be great as well. The tour is typically held in March. Our goal each year is to include elected officials along with FB members to visit local farms and ranches and share our stories and concerns.

We had an OFB County President's meeting in Salem in February. It was an informative meeting (it was so nice to meet in person) with ample sharing of issues and ideas. Ag overtime and ag labor, including immigration and H-2A programs, were two of the larger concerns. Water availability (or rather lack of water availability) is a huge problem in certain parts of the state. Besides lack of water for irrigation (in areas where they rely on irrigation to grow their crops), domestic wells are also going dry. Their water issues are challenging and are also a good reminder for us not take anything for granted. We have members on the OFB State Committees and are always keeping an eye on any local issues that might affect our county.

Finally, and sadly, Marion County has lost two prominent members recently. Roger DeJager, dairyman from Jefferson, served on the board for many years. He and his wife Jessie have contributed so much to the Oregon Dairy Industry and Farm Bureau. Young Farmer and Rancher member, hop grower and volunteer fire fighter, Austin Smith from St Paul tragically passed away in early February while on a fire call. He was only 30 years old but left a huge gap to fill in that small community. They were both inspiring and we will strive to honor and continue their legacies. Our sincere condolences, to their families, friends and communities.

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Bobbi Harrold, a dairy farmer from Lane County and vice president of the Oregon Dairy Farmers Association, voiced her opposition to the current form of HB 4002.

She is a fourth-generation dairy

farmer and her life is dictated by cows, she said.

"Calves aren't born on a 9-5 schedule and cows only seem to get out when you're sleeping, at church or at a party," Harrold said.

"Livestock operations don't always follow neat, predictable cycles. Recognizing the unique nature of caring for livestock to include these considerations would go a long way to making this proposal workable for farms like mine."
