Schedule Time for Agricultural Advocacy

Winter, a time when farmers are planning for the next crop year. While deciding what to grow, budgeting, evaluating last year's production numbers, and developing plans for the coming crop year, you are carefully calculating how much time is needed to prep ground, plant, prune, or market crops, and hoping and praying that nature will be kind this year. The choices you make now will have an impact on your operation this year and for years to come. Your resources are valuable - not just your land and money but your time as well. I ask that you also consider what fraction of your precious time you can invest in agricultural advocacy.

The Oregon State Legislature will be in session beginning February 1, and decisions will be made in the Capitol by our elected officials that may impact your operation's bottom line more than Mother Nature or the price you receive for your crops. There are numerous bills planned for this session that will be crucial: labor issues, water issues, and pesticide issues are just a few of the areas of concern for your farming operation.

As the gap between rural and urban viewpoints widens, it is no longer an option to stay on the farm and ignore what happens in the Capitol. Everyone in agriculture needs to find their voice and use it; we are greatly outnumbered by those who are unaware of the challenges that farmers face.

To stay informed you can use the Oregon Farm Bureau Action Alerts at oregonfb.org/legislation-get-involved. Another good source is the Rural Voices Coalition at oregonruralvoices.com. From these sites, you can sign petitions and submit letters and emails to legislators using your own story or using talking points suggested by the OFB staff. If you are comfortable telling your story to others, coordinate with OFB staff to testify at the Capitol. The OFB legislative lobbyists are some of the very best at the Capitol; however, real stories from farmers have great impact.

Though this may seem daunting, it needn't be. Our elected officials are just people - people who need to hear from you about the impact impending legislation will have on your family farm. One easy thing you can do is attend the Farm Bureau Reception at the Oregon State Capitol Galleria on February 17, 10:00 a.m.-3:00 p.m.

As you contemplate your resources this winter, remember to carve out a fraction of time for agricultural advocacy. The future of your farming operation depends on it.

Alexis Taylor Named ODA Director

Alexis Taylor, who formerly served US Department of Agriculture (USDA) as the Deputy Under Secretary for Farm and Foreign Agricultural Services, has been appointed by Governor Kate Brown to the Oregon Department of Agriculture (ODA). Confirmed by the State Senate on December 14, 2016, Taylor will officially take office on January 23, 2017.

Lisa Charpilloz Hanson has served as interim director since October 1, following longtime ODA director Katy Coba's appointment to the state's chief operating officer and director of the Department of Administrative Services.

Taylor comes to the ODA from its federal government counterpart, the US Department of Agriculture. In her role at USDA, Taylor was responsible for advancing international trade policy and leads efforts with states to support and open new, international market opportunities for US food and agriculture producers. Additionally, Taylor lead the USDA's Women in Agriculture Initiative, dedicated to fostering and growing a mentoring network for women pursuing careers in agriculture.

During her time in Congress, Taylor negotiated key provisions of the 2008 Farm Bill, as well as the Senate version of the 2012 Farm Bill which was ultimately enacted into law as the 2014 Farm Bill.

Before joining USDA, Taylor served as the legislative advisor to Representative Leonard Boswell, D-Iowa, and later, US Senator Max Baucus, D-Montana.

"Alexis brings a passion for agriculture, rooted in her Midwest, family-owned farm upbringing," Governor Brown said in a release. "I look forward to welcoming Alexis, who will be a strong advocate for our rural communities and Oregon's incredibly diverse agriculture sector."

Taylor was raised on an Iowa farm and graduated from Iowa State University. She served in the United States Army Reserves from 1998-2006 during which time she completed one tour in Iraq with the 389th Combat Engineer Battalion.

Grieving Indiana Farmer Gets Help From Fellow Farmers, Harvest Over 100 Acres In One Day

CONNERSVILLE, Ind. – An Indiana farming community came together to help a man coping with the death of his granddaughter.

Steve Wollyung was preparing to harvest the last 112 acres of his farm on November 5 when an unthinkable tragedy occurred.

His 4-year-old granddaughter Ayla was playing in a grain wagon when she became trapped in the wagon. First responders removed Ayla from the grain wagon, and she was airlifted to Cincinnati Children's Hospital where she later died from her injuries.

Tara Henry called up Steve's wife Carmen and asked if they were done harvesting, and Carmen told her they still had over 100 acres to finish and they weren't sure how they were going to get it all done.

Henry called a few farmers and asked if they would be willing to help. Word spread quickly and pretty soon more than 60 people from several counties contacted Henry about donating their time and equipment to help the Wollyung family.

Steve told FOX59 he was totally shocked. "I couldn't believe it when I saw everyone show up to help. All of the support and the number of people wanting to help is just overwhelming," Steve said. "It was emotional to see everyone. Whatever we needed, they brought."

Working together, they finished harvesting 18,463 bushels by about 5 p.m. Steve said it would have taken him about a week to do the work all on his own.

Williamson said this is typical of the farming community. "Most farmers look out for each other and would do that for anyone."

Steve says he hopes that by sharing his story he can raise awareness about how dangerous farms can be for children. "We're hoping this tragedy will help others down the road. Around Halloween, kids visit farms and play in corn mazes and it all looks so pretty and fun. But we need to teach them that farms are a place where serious work is done and it can be dangerous."
